PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE: SEPTEMBER 2014

QUOTE OF THE MONTH:

Hot Creek near the town of Mammoth Lakes is my **Home** Water. My very first day of fishing with a fly rod, nearly 40 years ago, probably with a Royal Wulff tied on, was at Hot Creek. Of course I didn't catch a fish. In fact it may have been well into the following season that I caught my first Hot Creek trout. But that first day changed my life because I found our sport, which I've never tired of doing, and I was in a place I loved to be.

I've fished Hot Creek hundreds of times since, always with dry flies. I've fished both the public areas and in more recent years, most often at **Hot Creek Ranch**. The Ranch has about 1.5 private miles of the Creek, and can only be fished by ranch guests (dry flies only; no wading).

In all the years I've fished the Creek, I only remember for sure, two 20" or bigger fish (I've seen much bigger). But there have been many more in the 16" to 18" class, and dozens and dozens of 12" to 15" fish: all wild, healthy and very strong. In the early years it was almost all Brown Trout, now it's mostly Rainbows. No one has ever explained to me why the Rainbows have replaced the Browns as the dominate species. Based on the reputation for ferocity

of the Browns, you'd think it would be just the opposite.

Along with Club member Bruce Harris, I was at Hot Creek Ranch the first four days of August. Bruce and I had a very enjoyable three plus days of fishing and enjoying the Eastern Sierra. The Creek was low, weed choked, very difficult, but fishable. Nonetheless, in spite of enjoying our stay, Bruce and I ran headlong into what we already knew: California is in an historic, extremely serious drought. Saturday August 2, due to the low water, decaying marine vegetation, and an 85 degree air temperature, the water temperature reached 71 degrees! That is a killer temperature for trout. They have to find the cool places, the deep holes, and then just hover. They're unable to use any energy, so they don't feed. And I got skunked! Although I know it happened in the early days, and I know there have been many days with few fish, I can't remember being skunked at Hot Creek. I'm glad I was skunked.

In retrospect, I wish I would have stopped fishing when the water hit about 69. But I didn't raise a fish anyway, so I suppose I was saved from being a fly fishing jerk; and probable wild trout kil-



ler. Luckily, late that afternoon it started raining. It rained all night, all day Sunday and most of the day Monday. By Sunday morning the water had cooled to the mid 60's and on the day we caught a few nice trout.

From the Creek I went to Lake Tahoe to join my family for the rest of the week. The Lake is down what appears to be three to four feet. Who knows how many acre/feet of water that must be. I spent a morning scouting the Truckee River from Reno all the way to the town of Truckee. Of course the Truckee is also very low. Places where it usually runs 500 to 700 CFS is now running about 100 CFS. My usual four favorite spots still look pretty good, but the high water temperatures have also had serious negative effects on the Truckee. I found a fly fishing class at the mouth of the Little Truckee breaking up midmorning after fishing early. The class of about 10 anglers caught two fish, both before the water reached 68 degrees, when they called it a day.

Federation of Fly Fishers ANNUAL FLY FISHING FAIRE

MAMMOTH LAKES, Calif. - The annual Southwest Council IFF Fly Fishing Faire - Sept. 19-21 - may look like just a dot on the horizon, but it's getting closer every day. With Connie Bullock of the Santa Clarita Casting Club at the helm and charting a course, a full slate of fly-fishing fun is filling the event calendar.



Headquartered at Cerro Coso Community College, 101

College Parkway, Fly Fishing Faire activity venues range up and down the mountain from Hot Creek to Lake Crowley and beyond. a virtual sunup to sundown potpourri of the sport. Faire hours are Fri., 9-5; Sat., 9-5; and Sun., 9-3 and admission is \$15 adult with ages 16-years and younger free; \$20 per family. Eastern Sierra resident admission is \$10. A single admission is good for all Faire days. Some workshops and seminars are included in the admission; other classes will have separate registration, materials or participation fees.

Fly Fishing Faire registration opens July 13 for club members with classes and seminars on a first-come-first served basis.

About 100 International Federation of Fly Fishers volunteers plus local professional guides will conduct hands-on education sessions ranging from beginning fly-tying and fly-casting classes, conservation seminars, entomology, techniques, rod building, area tours, just for women outings to onthe-river activities.

"With 90% of the fish caught by 10% of all anglers, the educational elements of the Faire will level the playing field," said Bullock. "Fishing without catching is just standing in the water and shive ring our classes and seminars will teach you to tie flies that bring fish to the net," she added.

Tenkara USA will provide hands-on seminars and on-stream classes to introduce anglers to that form of fly-fishing.

The Sat. night dinner and fund raising auction is slated for the Mammoth Event Center, 452 Old Mammoth Road in the shopping center on the second floor above Mammoth Sporting Goods.

Bullock promises "thousands of dollars" in raffle and auction prizes - primarily fly-fishing tackle, guide trips, clothing and artwork. Proceeds from the raffle will be utilized for local IFFF projects including fly-fishing with Boy Scouts, conservation and education including Trout-in-the-Classroom; and Project Healing Waters with wounded veterans in cooperation with VA Hospitals.

"This is a great event to bring a relative, co-worker or neighbor who always wanted to learn to fly-fish, but never had the time," said Southwest Council president Michael Schweit. "In a few class-room hours they will get all the basics without you needing to do anything _ except may be lend them a rod and reel," he continued.



SDFF Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing Midyear Re-August 11, 2014

This year the Club's Project Healing Waters program expanded from, the Naval Medical Center San Diego, to include veterans at the San Diego Veterans Administration Medical Center in La Jolla. This has resulted in a huge increase in the numbers of disabled veterans we are able to serve. We are now running our fourth fly-fishing class of the year and have another scheduled for October through November. The interest has been so great at the VA that the class to begin in October and the first class of next year in January are already filled. Purpose: Fund raiser for SWCFF **Participants:** 5 members per club (Controllers no longer required) Entry Fee: \$125 per club, \$35 per non-IFFF member or \$25 per IFFF member.

Each club selects their best 5 fly fishers to this event, based upon their own criteria. The tournament format is fashioned after the U.S. fly fishing trials: there will be defined beats, controllers, points and an awards banquet. Two (morning & afternoon) 2 hour sessions. - 1. Barbless flies

- 6. Flies must be fully dressed **
- 7. Single visible beadhead no larger than 4 mm or 5/32 inch. Controllers are no longer needed. take a picture of your fish instead.

Each participant needs a camera.

There is no cost for this clinic but it's only being offered to participants in the tournament.

CDFW Asks Trout Anglers to be **Mindful During Drought**





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
