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

Sandra is the Director of Cal Trout's South Coast Region and head of the South Coast Steelhead Coalition. Under her direction, the Coalition has grown to include dozens of government agencies and environmental and fishing non-profits.

She has been the driving force behind the tremendous efforts to recover the endangered South Coast Steelhead. She worked tirelessly for many years establishing the genetic "fingerprint" of our native trout, and now leads the efforts to restore four coastal streams to accommodate anadromous steelhead returning from the sea to their native spawning grounds. This work entails the removal of infrastructure such as culverts and check dams and elimination of non-native fish. She has led volunteers from SDFF and Golden State Flycasters on water quality surveys, fish counts and genetic sampling in our local headwaters.

Fly of the Month

PARACHUTE ROYAL WULFF

This is one of the best attracters around. On moving water, fish it on a dead draft. On still water twitch it around a little.



Hook: TMC 100 or equivalent size 12 - 18

Thread: 6/0 Black

Tail: Moose Body Hair Wing: White Poly Yarn

Hackle: Brown

Body: Peacock Herl, Red Thread or Floss

If you are not using a barbless hook, crush the barb now.

Start the thread one eyes length back from the eye of the hook, wrap back to the bend of the hook.

Cut a clump of Moose Body Hair and stack the hair to even the tips. Measure the tail material to one hook shank length and tie in at the bend. Trim the excess tail material. Return the thread to just short of the starting point.

Tie in a piece of poly yarn to form a post. Tie in the hackle feather (dull side facing the post) and post the wing and hackle together. Wrap the thread back to the bend of the hook.

Tie in three or four peacock herls and marry to the thread. Wrap forward to the post and take one wrap past the post and tie off and trim.

Take a length of red thread or floss, tie in at

the center point of the body and trim the tag.

Create a red segment around the body about

1/3 the size of the body length. Tie off, trim the thread or floss and secure with a drop of head cement.

Wrap the hackle around the post three or four times, tie off and trim. Form the head and whip finish.

Trim the post.

Casting Corner

San Diego Fly Fishers is happy to offer two free clinics each month to help you learn to fly cast or improve your skills. Several of our instructors are certified by the FFI and can help anyone develop the skills that will help you get the most out of your casts.

Basic fly Casting Lessons

This Clinic is best suited for beginners and novice fly casters. The clinic will help you develop the basic techniques necessary for successful casts with a fly rod. No experience is required to participate.

Intermediate Fly Casting Instruction

Tip of the Month:

A number of years ago Bill Gammels developed the 5 Essentials for effective fly casting after observing and talking to great casters and identifying what they all had in common.

The first of the five is: No Slack

This means that when we begin any cast, we want to have as straight a fly line as possible laid out on the water. No wiggles, no puddles... just a straight fly line. So that when we move the rod tip, simultaneously our 'fly' moves with it. This puts us in best control of our fly line and fly. Now when we direct, our rod tip, the fly line and fly does what it is told!

A roll cast is a great way to remove slack in our fly line before we pick it up off the water for our back cast.

Another way to remove slack is a quick pick up and lay down to get the fly and fly line out and straight with no slack to prepare for our next cast.

Remember, No slack!

May 2019

Ten years ago our club worked with California Department of Fish and Game and the Southcoast Steelhead Recovery Project to build a net barrier along the weir at Doane Pond in Palomar Mountain State Park.

The purpose was to prevent the stocked trout from getting over the weir and mixing with the native steelhead believed to be downstream. Now called "Fish and Wildlife", their fisheries biologist recently asked us if we could repair or replace the net. Of coarse, they wanted it done that week before the scheduled stocking. Alan Thompson and I made a trip up the mountain to check it out and were amazed to find the old net still some what in tact. We were able to clean out a lot of debris and make some repairs so the stocking could happen, but it was clearly time for a replacement net. We spent about \$100 of the conservation funds budgeted for support of the Steelhead Recovery Project on a new net, rope and ties. Thank you all for supporting our fund raiser raffle and auction coming up again at our June meeting.

Last Saturday, Mark Hedderson, Todd McGovern and I went back up to remove and replace the net. It was a beautiful day and the net went up well. Fish and Wildlife and the State Park Rangers are very thankful for our club's support.

If you have a chance to get up Palomar Mountain, take your fly rod to Doane Pond, catch some trout and let us know how the net is holding up. Thanks for your continued support.

BARRETT IS PRODUCTIVE THIS YEAR April 2019 By Gretchen Yearous

I had the pleasure of fishing with Warren Lew, another longtime Barrett fly fisher on April 8, 2019 for the privilege of participating in the Barrett media pre-fish reconnaissance mission prior to this year's May 1st opening day. Extra information is included in this newsletter submission for those who haven't fished Barrett.

We were in the gate at 7:00 a.m. and docked at 2:00 p.m. Barrett's regulations: artificial lures only with barbs pinched, catch and release only, and CA. fishing license required. CA Dept. of Fish and Game visits regularly now and the fines are steep. Please visit the Barrett lakes website for additional information on open season dates, costs, types of reservations available, etc. for complete details https://www.sandiego.gov/reservoirs-lakes/barrett-reservoir. It is a gated lake so please follow the instructions on when to arrive and when to leave. Reservation tickets are required and purchased through Ticketmaster website only this year on the 2nd Tuesday evening of every month at 7:00 p.m. The SDFish.com website (forum/Barrett) offers ticket trades and sometimes one for sale when someone can't use that date. Barrett is our premier Southern California uniquely managed population protected by catch and release only regulations which provides very large Northern bass, hard fighting bluegill over 11 inches, crappie over 12 inches, and an occasional catfish. Barrett lake was designed and operated as a preserve for the Northern strain since the Florida strain has taken over everywhere else.





The water level is the highest I have seen in 12 years. Capacity states 49% on the website. Visibility very poor – greenish. Temperature 64 – 6' down at 8:40 a.m. The shallow shelfs are mossy and green; but not nearly as bad as last year with slime so thick you could walk on it. Catching in these areas were more productive outside the shrub line. Lots of solid ground launch sites even for someone 4'11". The road was in the best shape ever; however, the last dip that held water was a little too deep for my sedan at this time. Note: no parking down at pig's cove with such high water. Expect to carry tubes, etc. down the road to the shoreline.

Feature Article March 2019

Soooooo.....how was the catching? Overall - Better than last year. Very heavy long fighting bass and bluegill.

The catching was slowed somewhat before 11:00 a.m. due to no wind producing glassy water. A few jumping bass observed trying to get some of the prolific midge hatch. Didn't rig up a floating line. Didn't see any baitfish balls or schools nor nesting bass. Heard frog chatter in the back of Hauser. Fished Hauser around the island and caught 2 bass – one broke me off. Warren was using his intermediate full sink and caught bluegill all day. I rigged with a 6 wt. full sink line in the calm hours and caught both species. Fished further down Hauser and tried one of my favorite places; but the water wasn't healthy enough – too calm and somewhat mossy so nothing sizeable. I will fish that area again; but further out. Becky Cove is full this year which I predict will be very good.

11:00 a.m. got some ripple water in Pine after doing a little hunting, and the catching really heated up. I switched to my 8 wt. wind rig with 20' heavy fast sink tip and caught one strong fighting bass after another interspaced with a few bluegill. One female was ready to spawn (pictured above) and rebelled when she saw the tube. Shallow and drop off depths both worked. Successful style: used both 45 and 90 degree angle to shoreline casting with success. Only caught 1 with the parallel to shoreline troll style. Warren was continuing his survey on how many colors of mop flies worked. I caught 8 bluegill and 8 bass. Warren caught 12-15 bluegill with some over 11 inches. The main bay didn't produce between 1:30 – 2:00 p.m. We both tried unusual pattern flies there; but that isn't the best biting hour anyway. Strike zones ranged from 5-8 feet. Didn't have time to check out the dock or the dam which traditionally are baitfish habitats; because, they like hard surface nesting areas such as dams, bridges, docks, and rocky areas.

Successful flies pictured: Black Orvis Rubber bugger, rust conehead leggy bugger, my happy legs invention with baby doll rattle eyes, brim fly, and the mop fly colors pictured here. Unsuccessful patterns tried: chartreuse clouser, EP baitfish, orange mop, bluegill colored fly, small

white buggers.



Flies with eyes do work better (either stick-ons or glued or dumbbells. Never did any good with my black pig jig I tied nor with Cathy Becks. For surface: frog patterns, stimulators, poppers – Lucky got successful with a ducktail stayner. Open to suggestions on this one

WHAT ADDITIONAL FLIES WILL WORK? For bass - early season brown/green crayfish, white and rust clouser, black muddy buddy, jig hook style black and rust meat whistle, green sculpin with eyes, gray and white clouser for shad patterns, the Paul special, buggers with rattles, the clacker fly from last year, green Orvis rubber bugger, black with rust hackle buggers tied with the rubber squiggly tails with big dumbbell eyes. Heavily weighted black marabou leech with red head and add a couple of articulated this year.

BLUEGILL: Rummage through your trout flies boxes - just about any nymph you have in size 10. Sierra Bright dot. Small size 10 buggers. Tie some Paul specials on jig hooks and some collar hackle flashabou buggers. Brim flies. I have heard the San Juan worm works too. I have had them take a size 4 Orvis rubber bugger. They are attracted to bright colors as well – orange or orange with brown, yellow bodies with brown hackle and tails, small Baghdad (skinny baitfish patterns) flies. Add some barred silly legs to nymph patterns. Ask anybody who has fished Barrett what bluegill flies worked for them – some intentional





River of the Month

The West Walker River is relatively small and resembles a stream in many places. It's headwaters lie in the mountains south of Sonora Pass, on the eastern crest. The water flows down to Leavitt Meadows at Highway 108. This area has lots of riffles with large boulders and pools. Pickle Meadows is in this area containing Brooks, Rainbows, Browns, and Mountain Whitefish. It is a classic freestone stream with easy wading. The fish tend to be small averaging about 8". An attractor dry such as a Royal Wulff with a PT nymph or Hare's Ear dropper is an effective rig. Midge larva patterns also work well in the deeper pools. The West Walker turns northward through a canyon at the junction of Hwy 108 and 395. It flows along Hwy 395 through this canyon. The West Walker usually clears by late June where fishing is productive using large weighted nymphs. Also effective are muddler minnows size 8-12 on a sink tip. Fishing is best when flows reach 150 cfs or less. Dry Fly fishing is usually during the last 2 hours of light, using an Elk Hair Caddis in tan, green, or brown. Another good pattern is the Royal Trude to imitate caddis. A Hopper with a dropper (BH Nymph) rig is a good mid-summer choice. The season is the last Saturday of April to Nov. 15th. 5 fish limit and 10 in possession in most areas. Special regulations apply to Kirman Lake, Lane Lake, and Roosevelt Lake.
