President's Message

The Covid phased opening messaging from our State and Local officials has been arbitrary, inconsistent and confusing due to personal agendas coupled with the overlap in jurisdictions. The Good News is our local Bays, beaches and some lakes are now open to recreational boating, water sports, kayaking and fishing. As of this writing, the State beaches are closed to surf fishing, but open to surfing! Rules obviously written by surfers! City of San Diego bays and beaches are open to all water activities, recreational boating and Fishing. Also, Coronado Beaches are open to fishing. Blacks Beach is open to fishing. Recap of the May Club Meeting (video conference)

On May 4th, about 50 members participated in our first club meeting via zoom. Guide Nathan Wray shared an on-screen presentation followed by questions from the membership. Thanks to Mike, David and Tim for coordinating the presentation. We look forward to meeting again in person, but in the meantime, this was a welcomed diversion from videos and Netflix.

Nathan Wray, Mammothflyguide.com

Guiding for 12 years, the last six out of Mammoth Lakes and Hot Creek Ranch, a former employee at the Troutfitter. Lives in Bishop.

Notes from the presentation:

To get the big ones, you must hike four miles or more to high altitude lakes, or use a pack outfit.

"Ice out" is prime time and usually lasts about 3-4 weeks in spring. It's weather dependent, so you can't go strictly by the calendar. Fish typically run 12" to 20" and preparing to spawn.

Ideal conditions are clear, windless days that allow for "hunting" the fish, scanning left to right. The water is often very clear, up to 70 feet visibility.

Slow cruisers are the most hungry, fast cruisers are difficult to attract, and fast movers are not interested in the fly at all. Schools of up to 50 fish are hungry and aggressive.

A typical rig would be 5wt rod, floating line with six foot leader and three feet of 5x floro tippet, casting an orange and green wooly bugger, size 10-12, with small shot, no bead head, or green scud, size 18, or combination. Strip set is mandatory. Lots of roll casting if the wind comes up.

Stealth is important, usually from shore without waders, but if you have them at some lakes it is a great advantage.

Yes, that means unless you want to target that big 32" brown with a streamer we will most likely be dry fly fishing the entire time. Nymphing means ridiculous results. Big Fish: West Slope Cutthroats, Rainbows, Browns and even Bull




Trout! Mike from the Clark Fork River Outpost is giving us \$550 off normal prices.

Trip Details:

- September 3rd to 7th, 2020
- 2 travel days (plenty of DIY fishing opportunity or simply relaxing with a high-end cocktail and appetizers)
- 3 full guided days in drift boats in between the travel days. 2 anglers per drift boat
- Pre-arranged float plan with rotation of the guides and fishing partners (unless you have a buddy you want to fish with all 3 days).
- 4 nights at the Clark Fork Outpost right on the Clark Fork River ~60 miles north and downstream from Missoula in the middle of the wilderness (Closest City: St. Regis, MT).
- 3 full guided days of fishing on the world-famous Clark Fork River in drift boats with the Missoula area's best fishing guides.
- Gourmet / high end meals, wines and liquor
- \$1950 (\$550 off regular price; ¹/₂ the price of the high-end MT lodges). MT regulates guides fees.
 I believe it's \$550 /day, but many guides charge more. So, we are getting a sweet deal.

Because we are most likely looking at quarantine for a good part of the Spring at least, we won't consider doing the 50% deposit thing until the summer timeframe, earliest.



Fly Fishing the Upper Kern River... by way of backpacking the Forks of the Kern Trailhead

I would like to gauge interest in a potential club trip to "The Forks". A handful of SDFF club members have joined me in 2 and 3 nighters in the wilderness at "the forks" over the years to this special fly-fishing paradise. I have always promised to do the planning for a club trip. On the assumption the world is free of its current virus issues, I'd like to gauge interest.

This is a backpacking trip. I backpack as a means to an end: Fly fishing. I don't hike for the sake of hiking. Backpacking is physical; this trail is physical (although rated as "medium"). It is a reverse hike (you hike in heavy with food and adult beverages down 1000 feet into the canyon and hike out lighter). It's not in significant altitude (less than 4,000 ft), but the hike out can be tough if you are not fit and/or if it's hot. If you want to learn more about the location: the trailhead crosses the Little Kern River just above the confluence of the Little Kern and the Main fork of the Kern River. It's about an hour north of the little town of Kernville, CA.

So, if interested please email me at: <u>TimHuck@InterKnowlogy.com</u> We'll work on dates later. Because of the below average snowpack year we'll be able to get in there and get lower flows conducive to great fishing between mid-July and mid-November.

San Juan River Trip (not a club sponsored event)

I have reserved a fully furnished 5 bedroom house that has river access in Navaho Dam for the week of October 11-16 2020 (6 nights). I have two bedrooms open for anyone interested in joining us for a week of fun and fishing. Each bedroom has a king bed and private bathroom. This is not an official sponsored club trip, so anyone is welcome. The cost is \$350 for each room. The San Juan is a wonderful tail water with over 7000 fish per mile and most in the 18"-20" size. Most of the river is very wadable, but if you want to drift it there are guides available.

Upper Kern River – Johnsondale Bridge Trail

"We all caught fish all day long and I mostly fished dries. It was a great day."

April 3-5, 2020.

Well, the COVID-19 work at home thing is killing me. Let's just say in addition to the stir crazy, I was stepping all over my wife's toes. I travel a lot in my job and have for over 20 years. So, because I have been home fulltime for weeks, my lovely bride of 31 years is ready to kill me. My wife is not used to me in her castle.

As for the stir crazy... well, it boiled over last week for me. Being home 24/7 for a guy that constantly travels in his job and loves talking in person to engineers... I couldn't take it anymore.

So, I backpacked the Johnsondale Bridge (JBD) trail and camped for two nights on the upper Kern. I called the Western Divide Ranger district before going and short of verifying my 2020 CA fire permit and the social distancing advice I got, they were totally supportive. The JDB trailhead is about 20 miles downriver of the forks trail crossing of the little Kern River above the confluence of the Little Kern River and the main fork of the Kern. The JDB trail has a lot easier access right on mountain road 99 just 15 miles north of Kernville.

I really wasn't worried about social distancing on that trail. And I was right. I hardly saw any humans for three straight days. The best thing about this trip, though, was meeting up with a couple young fly fisherman who found me through this site.



These two, Jason Headley and Joey Castellanos are over 20 years younger than I am. And because of meeting them I am no longer convinced the generation below me is doomed and going to destroy the world because of their lack of interest and experience and knowledge of the wilderness. Because of these two, I have hope for humanity after I'm long gone. I'm used to teaching kids about the wilderness. These guys taught me things! Do you know how to identify a Jeffrey Pine and that it smells like vanilla? I do now thanks to them... and now I am motivated and have already started learning about the native pine trees of the Sierra Nevada mountain range of California. These guys' joy of wilderness, and their joy of the flyfishing experience and their positive attitudes was intoxicating. It made me rethink the way I have taken some of the fly-fishing experience for granted. We texted on my way up so I knew they had a

couple hours of start on me. For some reason, I was skeptical I'd actually run into them while hiking. The trail is rugged, wild and gets away from the river in spots. But without seeing a single soul I ran into them in a primitive site right off the trail just 2.5 miles upriver.

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I initiated the discussion about the virus immediately. I'm a traveler and have been in airplanes just four weeks ago. So, with social distancing in mind we agreed to camp next to each other, but, 150 feet apart. Clearly you cannot get close fly fishing together. On the trail we kept the proper distance and even at the campfire we were separated appropriately. We did the cleanse hands thing with any food we shared.

Interestingly enough, I had only backpacked and camped on the JDB trail once before. A few years back. It was the first time I ever backpacked alone. And this was the exact same primitive spot. I knew the run in front of it was a great spot to fish. But, I didn't want to get any expectations up with Jason and Joey because I wasn't so sure the river would fish well so early in the season. So, we started to set up camp, geared up and commenced to fish right in front of the site. I hooked up on a dry fly on my second cast....hmmm... we continued to hammer the stretch of river right in front of the site and we all did well. Hmmmm...

We leap frogged each other for the rest of the day. I tend to move quickly... to my discredit.... I'll do about a max of 20 drifts and move. So I got way ahead of Jason and Joey at times. Not a problem. I just didn't want to worry them. We did well that first day. By the end of the day I reflected that I fished dry flies all day long. There never was a reason to switch to nymphing. There were bugs and rises all day long. Caddis first, then a pretty epic mayfly hatch. Midges were around all day. There were scattered huge (like size 14) mayflies that appeared to be drakes. Those Kern River rainbows really keyed on them. I did not have anything to match that big bug and it really didn't matter. My hook to land ratio at the end of the day was pretty bad. In the Upper Kern I am happy with a 50/50. That was not the case this day. I hooked a lot of fish. I only



landed very few. Tiny barbless dries and those native and wild Kern River rainbows are just a bad combo for landing even for the experienced. No big deal with me. I want them to shake off at my feet and not have to touch them anyways.

So, we got back to camp by nightfall, and it got cold quickly. The campfire helped. We feasted on fresh food. I hiked in a pork steak and they had a deer tenderloin. After eating plus of few sips of JD, I was exhausted so I hit the sleeping bag early like usual. I woke up a number of times during the night like usual. My broken down old body just doesn't relieve me of pain when I sleep on the ground. So, I knew it got cold. I just didn't realize how cold. In the morning there were icicles on my sun shower.

Day 2, Saturday.

This was going to be a big day. A full day of fishing. I suggested to the guys that we hike to where we stopped fishing the day before and start fishing up



stream from there. They loved that idea.

By the end of the day we made it so far...so many miles upriver....to places I have never been before. In staring at what my Garmin InReach 66i tracked me doing it looks like we made is almost 6 miles upriver from the JDB. Amazingly beautiful stretches of river. What is tantalizing is that the trail goes 11 miles.

We all caught fish all day long and I mostly fished dries. It was a great day. Very physical. 25,000+ steps; many of which were climbing or fighting current. We ate and the guys hiked out at sundown. I was on my own now. After warming up to the fire I put it out, then hit the sack early. It didn't seem as cold. At 2am I figured out why. It started raining. There's nothing worse than camping in the rain. By the time I got out of the sack in the morning it was still drizzling. This put the kabosh on another day of fishing. I just wasn't up for 40 degrees and raining knowing that would have squashed the hatches. Still happy, I packed up camp first thing in the morning and hiked out in the light rain. Then drove home, plowing through LA with zero




It wasn't excellent or great fishing, but it was good. I fished dry 90 percent of the time and hooked a lot of fish. When I did switch to nymphing, twice, I immediately stopped because the rises started again. I tried a streamer once for 10 minutes in a deep pool and failed. I switched back to dries and had success in the very same pool. There were really good mayfly hatches in the afternoons; midges all day. Even 7am rises. Really fun. I will now plan at least one trip up the JDB trail each spring before runoff forever. The key is hiking in as far as possible up stream. The River has already started its runoff period so my next chance in there will be on the forks trail mid-summer when it gets back under 500 CFS.

Notice how the river is way way under the beginning of runoff even in the drought years. Since we had a normal snowpack year that tells me we are going to get a herculean jump in river flow in May which will provide very dangerous conditions. They call it the Killer Kern for a reason. I always wonder if the river can get to 20,000 CFS putting the bridge in Kernville in jeopardy. I'll be watching that river like a hawk...and dreaming of getting back in there in the summer.



Flies That Keep On Giving

Willies Small Hopper



Super simple, very effective. Small hoppers pervade many areas and we might as well feed them what they like.

Hook:	Daiichi 1180 #10 or similar
Thread:	UTC 140 Rusty Brown
Entire Body:	2mm Craft Foam Tan
Under Wing:	Antron Yarn in Tan
Over Wing:	Turkey Feather
Legs:	Medium Tan Round Rubber Legs
Cement:	Super Glue

Cut the 2mm thick foam to 3/16" wide. Wrap the shank of the hook from the eye to the bend and back forward1/3 of the way forward, Place a slight amount of super glue there. Round the end of the foam and place the rounded end even with the bend of the hook and secure with a smear of superglue and a couple of wraps of thread then move the thread forward to the two thirds forward spot and add a slight amount of superglue make a couple of wraps of thread to secure. Tie in the Antron yarn and let extend beyond the bend 1/8". Spray a fixative or Dave's Flex-a-ment, or Sally Hansen's hard as nails on the backside of a turkey feather and let dry. Cut from the turkey feather a section with the grain of the barbules 3/16" wide and round the butt end and tie it in with the butt facing rearward just extending beyond the foam. Strip a pair of round rubber legs from the multiple section they come in, tie a knot in one end about 1/4" from one end or cut it to size, smear a slight amount of superglue on the knot to keep it secure, tie it in with the knot to the rear and facing downward, the leg should extend about even with the Antron and the front legs cut to about the same length. Fold the foam back on it's self to form a bullet head and secure with a couple of wraps then smear a slight amount of superglue on your thread and make a couple more wraps and your done. cut the thread and go fishing. You won't be disappointed.

Fly Tying

PHW leaders are revisiting the fly tying location and time. Expect a new schedule when available to include an evening tying session.


