

Trout in the Classroom a new area educational support



History

Trout in the Classroom (TIC) programs have been in place all across the country for more than 20 years, the results of numerous collaborations between teachers, volunteers, government agencies, and local organizations including (but not limited to) Trout Unlimited. The programs were designed specifically for teachers who wanted to incorporate more environmental education into their curriculum.

TIC in New York: In 1997, TIC was started in New York through the efforts of the late Joan Stoliar, volunteers from Trout Unlimited (TU) and the Theodore Gordon Flyfishers in 1997. Participating students from K-12 learn the importance of water quality and connect with their watershed by raising trout from eggs to fingerlings and then releasing them in a clean, cold stream in the spring. Since its inception, TIC in NY has grown from four classrooms to more than 200. This rapid growth is a testament to the program's adaptability, effectiveness, and ability to interest students of all ages and backgrounds.

SHOP VAC By Bob Bates

This is a go to fly for many anglers. It is a generic pattern representing many different insects. With its white wing and brass bead it has been called a great searching pattern. Roger Thompson, Inkom, ID tied this one at the 2009 East Idaho Fly Tying Expo in Idaho Falls, ID. It was developed years ago by Craig Mathews and company at Blue Ribbon Flies in West Yellowstone, MT

It can be used in streams or lakes. One reference said that it most effective in tail waters, but it is excellent in freestone waters. Any type of fly line can be used depending how deep you want to fish it. Some anglers use it as a dropper from a high floating pattern like a stonefly, hopper or may fly. When fishing it deep in a stream, adjust the length of the leader to be twice the estimated depth of the water. Then cast upstream so it will sink as it comes back to you. Watch end of the fly line to detect a strike. If you are using a floating pattern as a strike indicator be sure to watch it carefully. If the floating pattern does anything strange like stop, move upstream or sideways, tighten your line. It might be a rock or a nice brown trout. I usually don't STRIKE because that is when the tippet breaks. I just tighten the line, and if it wiggles it is probably a fish.

 In lakes you can use a floating line or any of the sinking lines to put the fly in the proper place. Let the fly sink to where you think the fish are, and then retrieve the fly in a manner to attract the fish. Books have been written on the subject.

Materials

Hook: DaiRiki 135, 14 **Bead:** Brass 3/32 Gold

Thread: Uni-thread, 8/0 white **Rib:** Copper wire, small **Body:** Pheasant tail

Wing: Darlon, Zelon or Sparkle yarn, white



Tying steps:

- Attach thread behind bead.
- Hold copper wire on top of hook, and wind thread over it to past the barb.
- Attach 6 or 8 pheasant tail fibers on top of hook.

- Wind thread forward to just behind the bead, and then wrap pheasant tail fibers forward to bead, secure and trim excess.
- Spiral the copper wire forward and secure. Wiggle the wire to break it off. Sometimes when the wire is cut, a sharp edge is left that cuts the thread. Also Roger is reluctant to use his good scissors for cutting wire.
- Select a small bundle of Darlon, and attach it as a wing behind the bead.
 Trim at back of the body. (Other tiers make shorter wings.)
- Whip finish, trim thread and coat thread winds with a little head cement.

Closing comments: As with any great fly there are a few variations. One tier used chartreuse wire. Another added two winds of lead free wire and shoved it into the back of the bead. Two others added a peacock herl thorax (under the wing and in front of the wing). They all sing the praises of the Shop Vac as a great fish catcher. It is easy to tie, so tie a few and go fishing.

Chollas Lake in the Crosshairs? A casualty of the current drought.





The story has been all over the local news views a wide range of options." media in recent days. An on-line edition of the San Diego UT dated May 6th and written by Morgan Cook said that in 2008 "the city was pumping about 53 million gallons of water into the lake annually, at a cost of at least \$140,000. That's enough to supply about 421 typical households for a year, or 501 households assuming they all cut 16 percent in line with the state mandate". This U-T Watchdog column was questioning the continuation of water delivery to a lake whose function is strictly recreational. The bottom line of this investigation is why this lake should continue to receive water when the rest of us have to cut back.

Darlene Luckins wrote in the San Diego Nature Examiner that Chollas Lake is a small lake in the middle of the city of San Diego. It actually has a long history that begins in 1901 when the reservoir was created. It was used to supply water to the city until 1966 when it was turned into a park and later a youth fishing lake. It is no longer supplying water to the city, but it is a popular place to visit for people who live in a very urban area. "Southeastern San Diego residents have been protective of their lake. There was a public outcry in 2007, after people started hearing rumors that the city might stop filling the lake because of costs to the water department. The park department took over the costs." UT May 6,2015.

A follow-up U-T Watchdog article entitled

fended_by Morgan Cook on May 14th generated the following quote "While turning off the water to Chollas Lake would seem to be a simple way to respond to the drought, the irreparable damage that would be done to the ecosystem surrounding the lake, in addition to the loss of an important public space, balances the equation," parks and recreation spokesman Tim Graham told the U-T after its original story. He continued by stating "The city understands and appreciates the renewed interest in the lake's water consumption," Graham said. "The city will consider that interest as it re-



The article mentions and unofficial on-line poll with 2000 respondents voting 86% opposed to using drinking water to fill the lake. Also mentioned that recycled water was not available. This article then tries to tie the city's handling of Lake Morena to its handling of Chollas Lake "That the city is now using Chollas Lake's ecosystem to defend

Drinking Water Use for Fishing Spot De- its decision to maintain the fishing lake with drinking water is frustrating to county residents who have watched large numbers of Lake Morena's fish die in the past. "I don't doubt that the city puts a high value on outdoor recreation," Jacob said in a statement Wednesday. "I just wish city water officials had displayed the same value at Lake Morena."

> It is apparent to me that this writer has Chollas Lake in their crosshairs and is generating articles that seek to end the existence of this recreational lake. The value to the community cannot be measured simply in million of gallons of water. What would this area look like without the lake. A dry dusty lake bottom capable of generating unhealthy dust storms that could jeopardize local residents, eucalyptus trees dying for lack of water creating an unpleasant environment to the many walkers around this lake (and judging their numbers the most popular activity at this park), and an opportunity lost to the youths of San Diego having an outdoor activity that is a great alternative to gang activity.






