The Zoom Teleconference platform has been invaluable to us. Our last two monthly general meetings were conducted on Zoom, with speakers sharing power point presentations on conservation and fishing opportunities. Craig Smith our local saltwater guide and bay fishing expert, will be our speaker for our Monday July 6 meeting. We must look at keeping this as an option for future speaker programs post-covid. We can easily link in a speaker through zoom or video to our projector at the SWYC.

Mel Ochs, Lucky Ketchum, Alex and Andrea Ray have been keeping our Thursday evening Fly Tying Congress active with fly of the week demonstrations and individuals sharing some of their own fly patterns with the group.

Alan Thompson and John Wylie are working on restarting the Sunday public Lake Murray Fly Casting lessons on strict social distancing guidelines.

Bruce Harris was joined by me, Mel Ochs, Alan Thompson, Paul Woolery and Larry Sorensen in teaching fly casting, knot tying and fly-tying demonstrations with the SWYC summer youth camp. We had some 20 kids getting an introduction to the art of fly fishing.

This past month we have seen our beaches, bays and some lakes reopen to fishing. The Sierras have reopened with some restrictions. Sierra campgrounds are open with health guidelines in place. Montana, Wyoming, Idaho, Utah are also beginning to open to fly fisherman. This is all great news. Ed Winczowski and I met Mark Hedderson at the McGee Creek Campground June 7-12. Ed and I fished the East Walker and Lake Crowley with Sam Vasily. Ed was sharpening his euro nymphing skills. We had a great day on Crowley. I had a couple of perfect days on Hot Creek hitting the PMD hatch. Mark was having fun on Crowley in his float tube.

I know many members have been eager to get out and fish. Mel Ochs and Bob Pharoah have continued their personal outings to the local bay sites; Liberty Station, Pepper Park, J street, Shelter Island, Glorietta Bay, and Grand Caribe Park. These are all easily accessible to float tuners and kayakers. Kai Schumann has rebooted the SDFF monthly outings with our morning trip to north Torrey Pines this past week. His next outing will be to a local lake.

Tim Huckaby, our Sherpa Guide and Eastern Sierra Fly Fishing Guru, has been researching, scouting, and planning some amazing trips to the Kern River and the golden trout wilderness for this summer and fall. Tim has also planned another heavily anticipated trip in September to Mike Hilligus' Clark Fork Lodge.

A word of caution. We must continue to remain on high alert with all our activities. I wear a mask, sun buff, everywhere. Always keep my social distance from other humans, even fly fisherman! This will be our new mode of engagement for the foreseeable future.

We can't control the events, the news, and the mania that is out there right now. I do not need to elaborate on this. We can control our back cast, our loops, our lines, and that magic place between about 1000 and 1400 in the hopes that a trout will rise.

Recap of the June Club Meeting (video conference)

On June 1st, several members participated in our second club meeting via zoom. Mark Sherwood, Samantha Kannry, and Kirk Blaine from the Native Fish Society presented "North Coast Revival" featuring news and information about the Eel, the Smith, and The Klamath.








The Smith is California's largest free-flowing river. **The river produced the state record steelhead, 27 pounds.** It also has a run of fall chinook salmon, coho, (silvers) and sea-run cutthroat trout. It's 325 miles are designated as a Federal Wild and Scenic River, but the waters are threatened by a proposed mining operation in Oregon located on the north fork of the Smith. Mark stressed that anyone who has never seen or fished the Smith should consider it a priority destination.

SDFF Club Trip: July 16-19 - backpacking to the Upper Kern River by way of The Forks of the Kern Trail


- Whether you are a beginning back packer or experienced, if you ever wanted to fly fish the hallowed grounds of the Upper Kern River, this is the trip for you!
- If you have never backpacked to fly fishing before and always wanted to, this is the trip for you!
- If you have been to the Forks and want to go back with a bunch of fun club members, this is the trip for you!
- If you are at a level of fitness to handle a 2-mile, 1,100 foot descent into the canyon (and the consequential hike back out with weight on your back), then this is the trip for you!

Join me (Tim Huckaby and a few other experienced club backpacking fly fishers) for 3 nights in the wilderness and as many hours of fly-fishing for wild trout in between. We'll be targeting a primitive camp site I have put a huge amount of work into right on a big bend and pool on the river that can hold ~15 tents. It's only 4.36 miles from the trailhead to the site. This trip is about fly fishing. We'll use backpacking as a means to an end.





Planning and communications for the trip have already started, but it's not too late to sign up. I am in contact with the Western Divide Ranger District on a large group permit, so I'll need to get a pulse on the size of the group, by Sunday night, July 5th. SDFF Club Trip - The Clark Fork Outpost on the Clark Fork River September 3rd – 7th, 2020

Hola Anglers. Assuming we are clear of the world's current virus issues, the club will be headed back to Montana! Please consider joining me, Tim Huckaby, and a bunch of other fun club members for the fly fishing trip of a lifetime...again. This one is a bucketlister...again.... a few of us have already checked this off the bucket list. Working with lodge owner Mike Hillygus, now a long-time friend of the club and multiple time donator to the annual fundraiser, we have picked the exact week of the year that this remote stretch on the Clark Fork River typically fishes its best. Yes, that means unless you want to target that big 32" brown with a streamer we will most likely be dry fly fishing the entire time. Nymphing means ridiculous results. Big Fish: West Slope Cutthroats, Rainbows, Browns and even Bull Trout!



Mike from the Clark Fork River Outpost is giving us \$550 off normal prices.

Trip Details:

- September 3rd to 7th, 2020
- 2 travel days (plenty of DIY fishing opportunity or simply relaxing with a high-end cocktail and appetizers)
- 3 full guided days in drift boats in between the travel days. 2 anglers per drift boat
- Pre-arranged float plan with rotation of the guides and fishing partners (unless you have a buddy you want to fish with all 3 days).
- 4 nights at the Clark Fork Outpost right on the Clark Fork River ~60 miles north and downstream from Missoula in the middle of the wilderness (Closest City: St. Regis, MT).
- 3 full guided days of fishing on the world-famous Clark Fork River in drift boats with the Missoula area's best fishing guides.

San Juan River Trip (not a club sponsored event)

I have reserved a fully furnished 5 bedroom house that has river access in Navaho Dam for the week of October 11-16 2020 (6 nights). I have two bedrooms open for anyone interested in joining us for a week of fun and fishing. Each bedroom has a king bed and private bathroom. This is not an official sponsored club trip, so anyone is welcome. The cost is \$350 for each room. The San Juan is a wonderful tail water with over 7000 fish per mile and most in the 18"-20" size. Most of the river is very wadable, but if you want to drift it there are guides available.

Sea Trials By Joel Stewart

I enlisted in the Navy in 1985. The recruiting posters of the day showed distant places captioned with the slogan "It's not just a job, it's an adventure!" Three and a half decades later that motto still proves true.

The Navy has sent me all over the world. By sea, land, and air I have been privileged to visit dozens of countries on six continents. I have been fortunate to fish in many of these locations. While not my purpose in being far from home, fishing is an outlet I can pursue outside of my duties.

Another chapter in this lifelong adventure has begun. I will be assigned to a remote tropical island. My duties are not relevant but the location is exceptional and the reason for this story. Fishing is allowed and a popular outlet for those on the island. There are no personal boats but kayaks are allowed. However a full-sized hard body kayak cannot be shipped. I found a solution. Bote, known for stand up paddle boards (SUP), introduced an inflatable kayak. Called the Lono Aero, it has the same construction as a SUP; it is rigid when inflated but folds into a sea bag sized package when flattened. It is the perfect set up for where I am headed.



Before I went to distant shores I had to check out this new boat. I headed to the bay to conduct sea trials. I got her inflated and assembled. Not the lines I was accustomed to, she still had a certain appeal. More flat bottomed than a traditional kayak and with high sides I could see she'd be a slave to the wind. I would get around that somehow. With built-in cooler, rod rack, tackle storage, tie downs, and sand spike it a very fishy craft.


As this was a test run, I loaded up the rod rack. A foursome of TFO rods adorned the stern: a 7wt Clouser, a 6wt Axiom II, a Traveler spin and a Traveler caster. I didn't plan to fish with all but I did want to see how a full assortment worked with fly casting. I put her on the dolly and rolled down the ramp.

She slid smoothly in and was ready for our first run. Gliding out of the marina was simple but as soon as we cleared the last dock the wind grabbed her bow. I dug deep trying to stay on track but the wind was winning. I switched sides and back paddled, hard. Her bow answered and came about. It was a struggle but I was able to cross to the far side of the cove. Out of the wind, I paddled about, getting to know her traits. She wobbled a bit but all in all was very stable. Not fast but smooth, I liked how she covered water.

Then the wind caught us again and I fought back to the lee. Satisfied with ahead and astern, I wanted to get her slimed. The Traveler spinning rod was rigged with a drop-shot plastic; deadly on bay bass. Three casts later that was proved true as a chunky spottie grabbed it. Once across the gunnel, it christened my craft. She was officially a fishing machine.




Given the current situation we now find ourselves in, I'm looking for ideas on how we can get together, perhaps virtually, to share news and information, as well as plan future events.


Contact Sherry Ashbaugh, Women's Program



If you ever catch a Green Drake Hatch (the largest) you are in for a treat. The flies are large and the fish devour them and your flies are big enough you don't have to strain your eyes. The female can reach 25mm and male's 20mm. don't leave home without this fly if the area you are headed has these super sized meals.

Hook:FinThread:UTAbdomen/Tail:GrAbdomen Binder:UNThorax:DaWing:LigLegs:GrSuper Glue:Ba

Firehole 315 #12 Competition UTC 140 Tan or Green Green Dyed Deer Hair (directions below) UV Cure Thin Dark Olive Dry Fly Dubbing Light Tan Antron Yarn Grizzly Hackle Dyed Olive Both Brush on and Gel Formula



Left: Needle placed in vice with thread

Right: Deer hair tied down on needle

Abdomen construction: Place Needle in vice securely. Start thread near the point and wrap loosely to the rear and back to the point. Cut a small clump of deer hair and clean of under fur and stack it. Place the clump with the tips extending just beyond the point and secure with thread from the point to the rear of the needle and whip finish at the butt. Trim your thread long. Coat the abdomen with a slight smear all around of thin UV fly finish and cure with a UV light, set it aside for later and make several a sitting. Cut two pieces of Antron yarn long enough to center the tie in three to four eye spaces back from the eye and tie in with several wraps of thread,

Place the hook in the vice. Smear a slight amount of superglue on the shank of the hook and run the thread from the eye to into the bend. Place your tail section onto the thread base with superglue and secure with several wraps of thread, wrap horizontally around the base of the wing post and leave your thread to the far side. Dub the thorax region from the base of the abdomen to in front of the post. Select a single hackle feather and strip off the base webby of the feather leaving the stem showing. Cut the stem and leave a short stub to tie in with the shiny side of the feather on top. Place a dab of gel super glue at the base of the post. Make several wraps of the hackle to form the legs and now make a couple of securing wraps of thread around the base of the post horizontally and then put the thread to the eye and make a few whip finishes to secure. No need to head cement the super glue has done that. Cut the post length to your liking. I cut mine so the post doesn't hit the top of my fly box. I wish you all well during this long home stay. All the best, John




