### SDFF Volunteers for San Luis Rey Water Sampling

In support of the California Steel Head Recovery Project, The San Diego Fly Fishers (SDFF) have volunteered to conduct periodic water sampling along the San Luis Rey River to determine if the river can support viability of native Steelhead.

Travis Pritchard from San Diego Coastkeeper, a local non-profit organization dedicated to protect and restore fishable, swimmable and drinkable water in San Diego County, conducted a water sampling training event at Chollas Lake in February for the SDFF volunteers to ensure proper procedures were followed so that the water samples were usable.

After several scheduled attempts were cancelled due to lack of rain which kept the river dry, seven energetic volunteers from SDFF led by Gary Strawn, SDFF Conservation Chairman, met on March 15 to conduct water sampling of the river. The hope was that recent rains would provide enough water to allow some usable samples. The weather that day was great, but only one of the four sites had enough water to sample. During the morning, the group got a call from Travis about a reported fish kill at the river estuary in Oceanside.

After visiting the four predetermined sites along the river, the group went to the estuary. Sadly, there were about a dozen dead fish along the banks, and some others were noticeably stressed when the group arrived. Several photos and a double set of samples were taken to document the fish kill and provide enough data to determine the reason for the kill. There were no signs of pollution, and the dead fish were determined to be striped mullet. The theory for the kill was that flushed nutrients and fresh water filled the estuary due to the recent rains, but not to the point of blowing out the sand bar blocking the estuary from the ocean, trapping the mullet in the diluted salt water. The California Department of Fish and Wildlife came out to inspect the site later.

Afterwards, the volunteers gathered at famous Nessy Burgers in Fallbrook to discuss the day's events and plan for the next sampling.

The event highlighted the conservation efforts of the SDFF, and caught the attention of regional and State officials. Cynthia Gorham, Head of the Regional

### AN OPEN LETTER TO OUR MEMBERS AND FRIENDS

Each year at this time, you begin to see the ads in this publication and hear the exhortations from our Raffle Chair to "attend, buy tickets and wins lots of great stuff!" Ever cautious of becoming overly serious in this endeavor (after all, we do this for fun), I want to take a slightly different tack.

It is indeed true that an important benefit of our annual fundraiser is to give our 300+ members the opportunity to walk away with 90+ items from our drawing and silent auction. Great odds at twice the price! However, for our newer members, let me reveal to you that is <u>not</u> the primary goal of this undertaking.

Quoting from our *Bylaws*, the mission of the San Diego Fly Fishers "is to further the art and sport of fishing with artificial flies, and to educate members of the general public in all aspects of the art and sport of fly fishing, and the conservation of sport fishes and the waters and natural resources containing them." Stated simply, our primary goals are education and conservation.

By way of example, as a result of our 2003 Raffle, in 2004 we donated \$4,300.00 to various conservation and education programs. By 2013, we netted over \$7,000.00 for those same purposes. Yes, in good years and bad, we have consistently increased our efforts in achieving our mission. However, given our stature among California fly fishing clubs, we can and should do more.

Over the past several years, we have broadened our joint conservation efforts with the San Diego River Park Foundation and the Living Coast Discovery Center in Chula Vista. We have renewed our support for Cal Trout and exponentially expanded our Project Healing Waters programs. As you are well aware, we continue our weekly Fly Tying Congress and Casting Instruction. Day at the Docks, Boy Scout Fair, Chollas Lend-A-Rod. Every program is an admirable one and the list goes on and on. And they do cost money.

Your Directors are doing all they can to ensure this will be a delightful evening. If you are wondering how you can do more, let me give you a slightly different perspective. If every one of our members spent just \$50.00 on tickets and/or the silent auction, our gross revenue would immediately increase to almost \$15,000.00. 

# FLY OF THE MONTH

## Olive Matuka





Type: Streamer - hook 3X long Hook: Daiichi 2220 size #2 to #12, TMC 5263, Mustad 9572 3XL Olive or black 6/0 Uni Thread Thread: Grizzly hen saddle dyed olive, Chickabou, (or rooster) two to four Tail: Medium silver wire of oval tinsel Rib: Underbody: Lead wire or lead substitute Olive medium chenille or dyed rabbit fur of dyed squirrel Body: Hackle: Grizzly saddle dyed olive Instructions: This fly can be tied in a number of different colors to suit your local fish. Try it in black,

orange or red for starters. (Olive is the best color.)

The idea of binding the hackle wing along the top of the hook shank originated in New Zealand over 50 years ago. The name comes from the bird whose feathers were used for the wing of the first versions of this pattern. The fly represents fry or minnows, but also makes an effective suggestive pattern of something a hungry trout would like to eat. It is a style that makes for a very robust wing that resembles the long dorsal fin of a bait fish. The Matuka fly is a Streamer/Lure pattern. They were introduced to the USA and the rest of the world about 1975. They have been tied in just about every color combination you can imagine. Have the hackle wings of a streamer fly you were using ever twisted round the gape of a hook while casting? When this happens, the fly moves through the water like a propeller, instead of swimming with a smooth, minnow-like action. If this really annoys you then change to using Matuka style flies.

In Britain this type of fly is called a 'Lure'. Streamers (including hairwings/bucktails) represent various small fish, and are tied on longshanked hooks. They may be tied as deceivers, imitations of local small baitfish or as vivid colorful attractors that suggest something alive, edible or a threat. The attractors are also designed to stimulate a predatory fish's aggression. They are usually a little heavier than the nymphs, and the wind resistance can vary depending on the particular fly.

A streamer is tied with soft feathers, such as cock saddle hackles or marabou, and is intended for fishing in relatively small and calm waters. By contrast, bucktails are tied with hair wings instead of feathers originally hair from a deer's tail, hence the name but also squirrel hair. They are more suitable for fishing in broad, fast waters.

Historically, streamers belong to the American east coast, while bucktails come from the west coast. All these flies are fished in the same way. It is both the easiest way of fly-fishing, and the method that yields the biggest fish! This may sound paradoxical, but it isn't. There are two reasons: you can do nothing wrong



with a big streamer or buck-tail and the fact is that big fish prefer big flies.

The nice thing about small fish compared with tiny insects and crustaceans is that, to a great extent, they can oppose the current. Being strong swimmers, they commonly dare to enter more open and rapid water As a result, the fly-fisherman can fish his flies almost anywhere he likes: up or down or across the stream, either fast or slow. The fly will be equally attractive in all cases, and you need not worry about whether the fly will drag. Really large fish have long ago given up eating small insects in favor of more

substantial young fish. Otherwise they would never have reached the size that makes them so desirable to us!


